| Armond Goes to a Party: A Book About Asperger's and Friendship, Nancy Carlson, 2014 | Armond doesn't want to go to Felicia's birthday party because parties are chaotic, which is hard for a child with Asperger's. With the help of his friends, he attends the party and has fun. | Autism |
| Back to Front and Upside Down, Claire Alexander, 2012 | Stan's class is writing cards for their principal's birthday, and he is frustrated when all his letters come out in a muddle. Stan is afraid to ask for help, until a friend encourages him too. After lots of practice, Stan's letters are the right way round and the right way up. | Learning |
| Curious George Joins the Team, Margaret & H.A. Rey, 2015 | George plays on an adaptive playground with his friend Tina who uses a wheelchair. | Mobility |
| Dad and Me in the Morning, Patricia Lakin, 1994 | Early one morning, a boy wakes up, gets dressed, puts on his hearing aids, and walks to a beach with his father to watch the sun rise. | Hard of Hearing |
| Don't Call Me Special: A First Look at Disability, Pat Thomas, 2002 | This book provides a simple introduction to physical disability, adaptive equipment, and how people with disabilities live happy and full lives. | Cross Disabilities |
| Hanni and Beth Safe & Sound, Beth Finke, 2007 | This book provides a good intro to guide dogs. Guide dog Hanni explains how she helps her guardian, Beth, who is blind. | Blindness |
| How I Learn: A Kid's Guide to Learning Disabilities, Brenda Miles and Colleen Patterson, 2015 | A boy with learning disabilities explains what it means to learn in a different way. (Reader may choose to slightly revise some sentences as they speak directly to a reader with a learning disability. | Learning |



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| Isaac and his Amazing Asperger Superpower, Melanie Walsh, 2016 | This book is narrated by Alex, who describes his many 'superhero powers'. He describes himself, what he likes to do, and what he finds challenging. Alex has Asperger's Syndrome. | Autism |
| Just Because, Rebecca Elliott, 2010 | This book tells of a brother's love for his sister and all the fun things they do together. Only as his tale unfolds does the reader begin to realize that his sister has a disability. | Intellectual, Physical |
| Keep Your Ear on the Ball, Genevieve Petrillo, 2007 | Davey is blind and tells his classmates he can do everything on his own. When he has difficulty playing kickball, the children work together to figure out how to adapt the game in a way that respects Davey's desire for independence. | Blindness |
| Looking After Louis, Lesley Ely, 2004 | Louis, who has autism, starts a new school. The story describes how Louis' classmates come to better understand and interact with him. | Autism |
| My Friend Isabelle, Eliza Woloson, 2003 | Isabelle and Charlie are friends who like to draw, dance, read, and play at the park. Isabelle has Down Syndrome and Charlie doesn't. | Intellectual |
| My Three Best Friends and Me, Zulay, Cari Best, 2015 | Zulay, who is blind, participates in a race on track and field day at school. | Blindness |
| Susan Laughs, Jeanne Willis, 1999 | This is a short, simple book about Susan, a little girl who does regular childhood things. It only becomes apparent on the final page of the book that Susan is in a wheelchair. | Mobility |
| Virginia Wolf, Kyo Maclear, 2012 | This book explores themes of sisterly love, compassion, depression and joy. Virginia wakes up feeling very gloomy. Her mood disturbs the people and places around her, turning their world upside down, until her sister Vanessa uses her talent as a painter to bring joy back into Virginia's life. | Mental Health |
